THE STATS: 1 in every 10 children in the US will become victims of child sexual abuse before their 18th birthday.

This includes sexual contact ranging from inappropriate touching and kissing--to rape, pornography and sex trafficking--plus everything in between. (according to new 2012 statistics from Darkness to Light)

*Good News: These statistics reflect a downward change from older CDC statistics of 1 in 4 girls and 1 in 6 boys.

THE EFFECTS: Child Sexual Abuse carries heavy, sometimes lifelong effects for its victims, including:

- o Depression,
- Self-harming (cutting, risky behavior)
- Inability to focus
- o Sleep disturbance
- Inability to retain a job
- Suicidal thoughts
- O Drug and alcohol abuse
- O Over-sexualization at a young age
- O Risky sexual behavior as a teen and into adulthood
- o Intimacy issues
- Relationship problems (including abusive relationships)
- Largely increased risk for chronic physical illnesses
- o Many more...

THE COST: \$9.3 billion USD in 2015 including health care, child welfare, special education, violence and crime, suicide and survivor productivity losses.

<u>PREVENTION:</u> 95% of child sexual abuse can be prevented through education.

Teaching prevention is easy! Talk to your children in <u>casual, easy conversation</u> from the time they learn to talk. Be <u>consistent and persistent</u> in these conversations, including teaching:

- Proper body part names: vagina and penis
- Recognition of the "uh-oh" feeling
- BOUNDARIES: It's OK to say NO to an adult who makes them nervous, scared or uncomfortable. Practice: "Stop! I'm going to tell on you."
- BOUNDARIES: **No one should see, touch, or take pictures** of their private parts, or ask the child to see, touch or look at photos of someone else's private parts (where a bathing suit would cover).
- DISCLOSURE: **Have them choose 2 safe adults they can tell** if someone is asking them to do things that make them uncomfortable (or for little kids the "uh-oh" feeling).

<u>DISCLOSURE:</u> Predators are hidden and safe only because 9 out of 10 children don't tell.

Some common factors that prevent children from telling are:

- The predator tells them no one will believe them.
- The predator tells them they've done something wrong and they'll get in trouble.
- The predator threatens to harm them or a loved one if they tell.
- The child/teen is afraid of harming their non-offending family members.
- The child is too small to tell in a way that adults can understand.
 *This is why teaching proper body part names is so important.
